Māra Kai Challenge

Terms 1 and 2. Challenge events in Hamilton, Taupō and Eastern Waikato early in term 2

He tīwhiri | Quick sustainability tips



Start the year with a waste audit!

They're a fun outdoor activity and a great way to accelerate whakawhanaungatanga between students. Carrying one out at the beginning of the year creates a benchmark. You'll then have the rest of the year to learn, act and reflect on changes. Repeating a waste audit then also allows you to monitor changes over time and gives you a fabulous data set for numeracy learning. To arrange for your class to complete a waste audit this term, contact your Enviroschools Facilitator. They'll provide all the necessary equipment and can facilitate the session.

Ngā hua | Our stories

Very hungry helpers

When Hugh Gourlay made the long trip up to the Waikato from Canterbury, few would have suspected the curious contents he was carrying in a rather special suitcase.

The Entomologist and Senior Technician at Manaaki Whenua – Landcare Research, who has studied and raised biological control agents for over 40 years, had a very special mission in mind late last year for students at Ngāruawāhia Primary, St Paul's Catholic and Ruawaro Combined Schools.

The rangatahi waited with bated breath as Hugh slowly opened the suitcase before them to reveal an army (to use the correct collective noun) of very hungry caterpillars.

Larvae of the Honshu White Admiral butterfly (*Limenitis glorifica*) are a natural predator of one of New Zealand's most invasive pest plants, the Japanese Honeysuckle (*Lonicera japonica*).

The students' mission, which they eagerly accepted, was to raise them and learn more about their important role in keeping these problem weeds under control.

All three schools faced a steep learning curve, as the delicate creatures had only once before been successfully raised for



intentional release – at the Karangahake gorge near Paeroa. What surprised the students, was their short lifespan.

Naturally, the children were upset when the butterflies died and, unfortunately, many thought they had done something wrong.

"We learnt these butteflies don't live very long – only five to 10 days; they lay eggs and then they die," said students at Ngāruawāhia Primary School.

Curiosity was definately sparked, though, and all classes wanted to continue trying to raise more butterflies this year.

The project was initiated by Waikato District Council and Waikato Enviroschools and funded by the Waikato Regional Council's Environmental Initiatives Fund to support hands-on learning about insects as bio-control agents.

Reflecting on our journey together

Congratulations to Te Miro School on reflecting beyond Green-Gold in December, and Marotiri School, Tirau Primary and Rotokauri School on reflecting at Bronze in 2022!

Reflection is an awesome way to acknowledge the efforts schools are making at whatever stage they may be in on their sustainability journey. It's also an integral part of the Enviroschools learning cycle, helping us to make sense of our experiences, deepen our learning and gain direction for the journey ahead.

Here's what one student from Te Miro had to say about their last reflection and what it meant to them:

"I loved talking about the bush and the work we do, how we plant trees and the celebrations we do. The best thing about today was showing you guys around the school, because I'm really proud of the school and how we treat it."

It is exciting to see a number of Enviroschools across Waikato are planning a holistic reflection on their Enviroschools journey in 2023.

Pukenui zooms ahead

Teaching during the lockdowns was tough, and it's tempting to put the whole experience firmly in in the rearview mirror.

But out of adversity, as they say, comes opportunity. And the convenience and efficiency of hybrid learning is something schools like Pukenui are now seizing the opportunity to accelerate.

In 2022, they'd been growing their connection to and understanding of the native bush track within the school grounds, Te Ara Poutama.

Through online visits from their faciliator, Camilla Carty-melis, which were the only option available during the red alert level setting, they were given planned and self-directed activities, including vision mapping, biodiversity explorations and tree planting opportunities.

They found that some trees were suffering from insufficient water supply, especially during the summer months, and came up with a range of possible solutions.

One was the installation of rainwater harvesting kit, drawing on funding support from the Enviroschools fund. This, in turn, spurred other interesting avenues of enquiry and learning opportunities around water conservation, efficient watering and irrigation.

The rangatahi, supported by their teacher, Mrs Crown, and facilitator, Camilla, made a plan to work with the caretaker in term 3 to purchase and install a rainwater harvesting system.

Their experience demonstrated how a deep-dive project, with a range of different learning opportunities, could be effectively delivered even when in-person visits aren't an option.









Due to the success of the regular zoom sessions they've had with Camilla over the past few years, Pukenui has now adjusted their plan for the end of 2022 and beyond to incorporate regular 'online visits' as well as in-person sessions.

As a result, they now have greater access to their facilitator for classroom activities and student interaction, supported by in-person visits as required.

Camilla said: "Less travel time means more facilitation time. At Pukenui, we worked with Mrs Crown during the pandemic to come up with an alternative that ended up supporting students even better than expected.

"It allowed for more efficient use of time and resources, and actually increased student engagement with the Enviroschools kaupapa. More teachers are now showing an interest in the hybrid delivery model and I think it's a great option to consider."

Kāhui Ako teachers only day

Following postponements last year, the Waikato Catholic Kāhui Ako managed to connect in February, hosted by St Columba's School in Hamilton.

Teachers heard from inspiring speakers and took part in some engaging workshops, including one delivered by the Enviroschools team.

Our workshop showcased the great range of resources and support on offer to schools to integrate sustainability seamlessly into local curricula and contexts.



We also focused on creative and culturally responsive approaches to teaching and learning, exploring ways to weave together key threads, from Māori perspectives, to action competence and literacy.
