# KIUTA HEALTHY CATCHMENT, HEALTHY HARBOUR



#### Kia ora

Welcome to your first Coromandel/Manaia harbour catchment newsletter. This newsletter is about information gathering for your harbour and catchment management plan, which requires your input into its direction and actions. We hope to see you at a drop-in session on Saturday, 19 October, to learn more and get involved.

We held a hui at Manaia Marae in August to hear from the community and agencies about what needs to be done collectively to help restore the Manaia River. A restoration plan for the Manaia River and information gathered from that hui will become part of the Coromandel/Manaia Harbour and Catchment Plan.

In the meantime, if you've got a wetland, bush or stream enhancement project in mind, or want to carry out river management or weed control on your property, find out what we can do to help. The Whitianga Integrated Catchment Management team is a wealth of information, and we also give financial help for restoration works, soil and stream management and animal and plant pest control. We look forward to hearing from you.

## WHAT IS HARBOUR AND **CATCHMENT MANAGEMENT?**

For Waikato Regional Council, it's about the mountain ranges to the sea - identifying issues that relate to our land, water and communities, and developing a grassroots approach to remedy them. We recognise the need to consider social, cultural, environmental and economic outcomes. Importantly, we like the work to be owned and driven by the community, for the community.

We already have plans for Wharekawa (Ōpoutere), Whangamatā, Tairua and Whangapoua (see waikatoregion.govt.nz/hcmp), and have completed the community engagement for Whitianga/Mercury Bay. In those catchments, willow clearance along stream banks, riparian and forest fragment protection, wetland restoration, stream and flood management and coastal vegetation control (mangrove seedlings and saltwater paspalum) are jobs well underway.

It's now time to take a look at what we can do for the Coromandel/ Manaia catchment. We know your community wants a high standard of water quality, to reduce the amount of sedimentation entering the harbour, and not leave it to degrade.

#### **THE COROMANDEL/MANAIA CATCHMENT**

We are looking at an area from Long Bay, in the north, to just past Waitotara Stream at the seaward edge of Manaia in the south and are keen to understand community concerns and aspirations for the wider catchment.

The land area covers 14,000 hectares and includes 62 kilometres of main streams. It can be split into six sub-catchments: Driving Creek, Whangarahi/ Karaka/Pitoti, Te Kouma/Awakanae, Waiau, Manaia and Waitotara. Of the land area:

- 67 per cent is indigenous vegetation
- 15 per cent is pasture
- 15 per cent is plantation forest
- 61 per cent is moderately steep to very steep (between 21 to >35 degrees)
- 17 per cent is beef and sheep farming (no dairy farms identified).

Collectively, Coromandel and Manaia harbours cover about 2367 hectares, have about 55 kilometres of harbour margins and 73 kilometres of coastline.



### WHAT THIS WORK WILL COVER

Your information will help us and other agencies identify and prioritise specific works for the catchment. It will also help landowners and interest groups identify what work they can do to help improve the environmental health of their catchment and harbour.

You and your community will determine the focus of this work. Things to look at include water quality, sedimentation, biodiversity, riparian vegetation, pest plants and animals, flood-prone areas and preserving local values.

It is important to note this is a non-statutory exercise and will not preempt the co-governance plan to be produced as a result of the Pare Hauraki Collective Treaty settlement, nor change any existing consents that people hold.

#### **GATHERING AND SHARING INFORMATION**

Collective wisdom, knowledge and experiences are crucial for developing this plan. We need to paint a picture of what this catchment was like, is like, and what we want it to look like in the next 50 years.

There are various ways we will collect and share information:

- Drop-in sessions on Saturday, 19 October, and again once we have collated the information.
- Local media through your local papers we will be keeping you up to date.
- Rural landowner workshops.
- Newsletters more will come, and in them we'll be reporting on catchment condition surveys, our community survey (included with this newsletter), and what we have heard are the key themes and concerns for the Coromandel/Manaia catchment.

We need to understand the priorities and challenges in your catchment from your point of view. We are holding a drop-in session in Coromandel on Saturday, 19 October 2019.
